13th October 2024 The Twenty-first Sunday after Pentecost

Dear Parishioners,

Of the six holy people remembered in our Church Calendar this coming week, four of them are denoted as martyrs. To be classed as a martyr in church terms is a pretty big thing, more honourable than being 'emeritus or honorary' better even than just an 'ordinary saint'. To be a martyr means that having been loyal to Jesus as God's Son has led to the loss of one's mortal life.

It is not only Christianity which admires martyrs, witness the many people prepared to die in the name of Allah in some sections of Islam, or Sikhs, or Bahá'í Faith members, and there are many more instances.

What leads to a person becoming a martyr? Sometimes it can be as simple as being in the wrong place at the wrong time such as for Hugh Latimer and Nicholas Ridley who got caught up in the social, religious and political turmoil of 16th century England (called the English Reformation), or in the case of Ignatius of Antioch a person who fell foul of the political rulers of his day who were keen to turn people away from worship of Jesus Christ because to be a follower of Christ was at the time considered to be 'anti-state behaviour'. This fate befalls many Christians in various places in the world today.

Of course there are also occasions when people with very strongly held beliefs fall out with friends, neighbours or the wider society but if their beliefs and actions contribute to their untimely death should they be automatically regarded as martyrs? This may seem to be a silly question, however it is important that we do not fall into the trap of considering ourselves or another person as a martyr for the faith if all they are being is awkward and/or obnoxious.

In today's gospel reading Jesus again puts out the challenge to anyone who wants to be a follower of the Way, "what is the most important thing in life for you?" The rich young man seemingly failed the challenge as do we no doubt because we haven't understand Jesus's challenge for what it is. Where is your affection placed, is in yourself, your career, your social group etc. or is it God and God's kingdom?

As for the man in today's Gospel, so for us this is a challenge to be pondered and acted out every day.

For examples of people who did this very thing look up the other saints for this week.

St. Luke the Evangelist was born perhaps in Antioch (modern Antakya, Turkey), of a Greek-speaking pagan family. He was converted to the Christian faith and became a fellow worker of St. Paul. He was likewise a physician, because St. Paul refers to him as "our most dear physician" (Col. 4:14). Luke first met St. Paul at Troas (Acts 16:11), then accompanied him to Jerusalem (Acts 21:17), and remained with him during his imprisonment in Rome (Acts 28:14b–16; 2 Tim. 4:11). Luke handed down an account of the beginnings of the Church in his Acts of the Apostles, and from St. Paul's preaching he compiled the Third Gospel. It is uncertain where he went after St. Paul was martyred in Rome. Tradition has it that St. Luke was martyred toward the end of the first century.
