Christ, be our light

The Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to Luke [3. 7-18] Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, 'You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, "We have Abraham as our ancestor"; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the axe is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.'

And the crowds asked him, 'What then should we do?' In reply he said to them, 'Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise.' Even taxcollectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, 'Teacher, what should we do?' He said to them, 'Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you.' Soldiers also asked him, 'And we, what should we do?' He said to them, 'Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages.'

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, 'I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.'

So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.

The Third Sunday of Advent

How will people ever learn that the Bible and its message are politically relevant—that the proclamation of God's kingdom challenges the kingdoms of the world—if we omit the verses that say so (in this case Luke 3:19–20)?

Josephus tells us that Herod regarded John as a threat. Well, he would, wouldn't he: a fiery prophet drawing crowds and talking about God's kingdom. Luke tells us that John singled out Herod for direct attack. It wasn't just that Herod's marital arrangements were unethical, out of line with God's ideal. The point was that they disqualified Herod from being God's true king. John pointed to Jesus as the genuine king of the Jews; but this meant confronting the claims of the existing king. How could Jesus be the king? Because Herod was a sham. How could you tell that Herod was a sham? Look at his personal life. The attack on Herod, and John's imprisonment and subsequent death, are part of the inner meaning of his kingdom-announcement.

The pattern of polemical kingdom-proclamation is deeply rooted in the Hebrew Scriptures. Zephaniah's message to Israel, of long-awaited joy and relief, needs to include the reassurance that God will deal with all oppressors outside, and all prejudices within, his people. The enemies that have made Israel's life a misery will do so no more; the destructive honour/shame culture that has kept the physically handicapped as second-class citizens will be swept aside. All God's people will join in the great celebration. No one versed in Scriptures such as these could fail to see that they were coming true in the work of Jesus, as the lame and the outcast found themselves healed, welcomed into the family at last.

We can keep the political implications of the gospel at bay by removing some passages; we can achieve the same result by reading others without noticing their wider context. When Paul told the Philippians to 'rejoice in the Lord', he was writing to a Roman colony

CCLI 637628 where 'Lord' meant Caesar, and where celebration was what happened on Caesar's birthday and many similar imperial festivals. Philippi, along with many other cities in Greece and Turkey under Roman rule, relied heavily on the *pax Romana*, the peace which had come after the civil war a century before, and which was maintained by heavy-handed and often brutal rule. Against this ambiguous blessing, Paul places 'the peace of God, which passes all understanding'. In the true King, Jesus, God has won the victory over enemies more dangerous and subtle than those of the Roman state. The Advent hope that God's peace will one day rule in the world enables it now to rule in our hearts, and gives us the courage to proclaim the gospel of the kingdom, even when this means challenging the kingdoms of the world.
