It is interesting to note that over time the Christmas Day services are becoming less attractive and the Christmas Eve ones more attractive.


Then last Sunday we had our first COMBINED PARISHES SERVICE at St Michael's, and what a wonderful service it was.

EMERGENCY APPEAL LAUNCHED FOR PEOPLE AFFECTED BY THE VANUATU EARTHQUAKE

ABM AID has just launched an emergency appeal for those who have been affected by the 17 December earthquake that hit near Port Vila, causing deaths, injury, and destruction of buildings and other infrastructure in Vanuatu's capital city and surrounds.

We ask you to pray for all people affected, and for our partner, the Anglican Church of Melanesia, and especially for the Diocese of Vanuatu and New Caledonia, as it responds to the tragedy.

by force increasingly aroused the intense hostility of the Puritans. Among the chief grievances were that he made the communion table rather than the pulpit the centre of the church, that he suppressed Puritan lecturers, and that he punished all opposition to his designs with heavy penalties. At the sitting of Convocation in 1640 he introduced new canons, proclaiming the Divine Right of Kings, and compelling whole classes of men to swear never to 'consent to alter the government of this Church by archbishops, deans, and archdeacons, etc.'. This formula, known as the 'etcetera oath', exposed him to general ridicule and had to be suspended at the order of the King. Soon afterwards he was impeached by the Long Parliament. In 1641 he was imprisoned in the Tower, but his trial did not begin until 1644. It is generally held to have been conducted without regard for the demands of justice. He was executed on Tower Hill, London, on 10 Jan. 1645, after repudiating the accusation of 'Popery' and declaring his adherence to the Protestant Church of England.

Laud's apparent failure arose from his inability to understand the popular leaning towards Puritanism and the hatred aroused by his violent measures against all who did not share his own views on ritual. In doctrinal matters he showed himself broad -minded and conciliatory. He sought to improve the economic condition of the national Church, but thereby he promoted its identification with a political party. He left a remarkable private diary recording especially the events of his last years.

10th January—William Laud, 1573-1645

Archbishop of Canterbury. The son of a master tailor, he was born at Reading and educated at St John's College, Oxford, of which he became a Fellow in 1593. In 1601 he received holy orders, and in 1611 he was made President of St John's. From a very early date he opposed the prevailing Calvinist theology, and sought to restore something of the pre-Reformation liturgical practice to the C of E. In 1616 he was made Dean of Gloucester, where he moved the communion table to the east end of the choir, an action that brought him into violent conflict with the local Puritans. He was appointed Bishop of St Davids in 1621 and in 1622 he conducted a controversy with the Jesuit, J. Percy, commonly known as 'Fisher the Jesuit', in which he maintained that the RC Church and the C of E are both parts of the same Church Catholic. Under Charles I his influence increased. In 1626 he was translated to Bath and Wells, and in 1628 to London and in 1633 he was again translated to become Abp. of Canterbury.

As a member on the High Commission his attempts to impose liturgical uniformity
