# The Presentation of Jesus in the Temple

#### Dear Parishioners,

The Presentation of Jesus at the Temple is one of numerous occasions where we are told that Mary and Joseph, or Jesus and the disciples were doing something that was 'customary under the law'. This particular occasion, is not just a fulfillment of religious obligations; it is a moment rich with meaning, signifying the continuity of faith and the recognition of God's promises in the life of Jesus. This gospel passage can also be a reminder to us of the importance of ritual and tradition in shaping our faith.

Customs and rituals, while often grounded in tradition, serve to keep us rooted in our faith. They connect us with the generations before us, and with the greater community of believers, both present and past. The Anglican customs we uphold in our worship—our prayers, our hymns, our liturgies—are more than practices of tradition; they are expressions of the shared faith we celebrate together. They help us remember our own history, our roots in the early Church, and the Christian community that has stood through centuries of change.

Tomorrow marks the anniversary of the first Church of England church service in Sydney. Since then, generations of Anglicans have gathered to worship, to pray, and to continue the faithful customs of the Church in this land. Just like Mary and Joseph, parents have brought their children to church, to give thanks to God, to pray that they will grow in God's service. The sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist are important rituals and moments in our faith journey, and they are opportunities to share our faith, and encourage each other, strengthening not just ourselves but the entire community. In doing so, we live out the promise of faith, hope, and love, and are part of an ongoing legacy, continuing the customs of the Anglican tradition while finding new ways to live out our faith in a world that is ever-changing. These traditions and customs, are also what sustains us during difficult times in our life and faith journey.
